Yellowstone in winter

In January of this year, Janet and I had a trip to Yellowstone National Park. This is our favourite of all the wonderful US National Parks, but visiting in winter requires support from local experts and lots of good clothing. Yellowstone was the first US Park to be officially created in 1872. It is at an average elevation of 8000ft, and sits immediately above a super volcano which gives rise to the amazing geothermal features. It has a huge temperature variation with average summer daytime between 21 and 27 C but in winter between -5 to -20 C. There is an abundance of wildlife, and sometimes viewing is even better in the winter than at any other time of year. However in winter due to the conditions, access to the park is only allowed from the west and north entrances, and then only with four wheel drive vehicles and experienced drivers.



This link should give you access to a short 15 minute AV of the trip, which I would have shown at the cancelled member's evening last Tuesday. I hope you enjoy it.

How small is a coronavirus?

For a typical full frame 30 MP camera each pixel is around 5300 nanometres (one billionth of a metre). A Coronavirus measures about 120 nanometres across. That's around 45 times smaller than a pixel. No wonder they are difficult to manage!
